3 Pre-application consultation re 34b Haddington Place 14/02115/PAN

Colin Smith of Turley (http://www.turley.co.uk/office/scotland-edinburgh) made the following points. This consultation is about the gap site on Leith Walk next to McDonald Road library. Having recently changed hands, this site is the subject of a serious development proposal, now at the early stage of the planning process. Consultation includes speaking to local bodies (e.g. LCCC, New Town and Broughton CC, Cockburn association). The design has not been finalised – two variants have been sent to Edinburgh Council's planning committee. However, the main idea is mostly student accommodation but retaining the ground floor for class 1 (shop) and 3 (restaurant & hot food) uses such as a pay-as-you-use gym. They intend to make the main application in August – to that end, there will be a staffed exhibition at McDonald Road library on 24 June (2pm-8pm). Work should start in 2015.

David Clancy of S Harrison Developments (http://www.s-harrison.co.uk/projects/current/haddington-place-edinburgh/) made the following points. They are a family-owned 62 year-old business with a wide-ranging, good track record of work on sensitive, historic buildings in York and elsewhere. They now aim to expand to Edinburgh and Durham, which have similar planning environments. They understand that planning can be sensitive, hence they aim to do all relevant preparation before submitting the application. Because they now own this site, they intend a quick, efficient project. This will include improving the site's look, e.g. dealing with fly-tipping and installing new hoardings (for which planning permission will be needed.)

Nicholas Roberts of Weare ICA made the following points. They intend a building that will bridge the current gap in sympathy with neighbouring buildings and the character of Leith Walk. The building is likely to be 3 or 4 storeys, while nearby buildings are 5 to 6 storeys.

3.1 Questions and comments

The secretary asked about the materials to be used, and why student accommodation was planned given that several previous student accommodation (SA) schemes had fallen through. **Responses:** main material will be sandstone (darker, stain-resistant material at the bottom) due to site being on the edge of the conservation area. The SA market is changing – accommodation nearer the universities is expensive, there are very few Edinburgh students in purpose-built accommodation and there is a move away from HMOs.

A Finlay asked about accommodation numbers. **Response:** around 200 places are anticipated for this building (around 70% as clusters [equivalent to flats for 5 or 6 people], 30% studios [self-contained apartments] at the rear of the scheme.)

H Tobermann asked who would run the building once it was built. **Response**: almost certainly not S Harrisons.

J Siann noted that a crucial feature of a previous design was the interlock between the new building and the library. Would the main entrance be as previously planned? **Response:** Very much as previously planned – the new building would step away from the library, with a glass separation.

A Finlay asked whether student population %ages had been considered. **Response:** Firstly, this is a good area for student accommodation, given the existing scheme on McDonald Road and the good transport links on Leith Walk. Edinburgh Council's student population density (SPD) guideline is 30%. This site is part of 2 datazones. In one, the SPD is currently 26% — with 200 more students it would rise to 33%. If the other datazone is included, after development the SPD would be 28%.

M Donaldson asked about accommodation contracts. **Response:** Normally, cluster-room lets are 43-44 weeks because such students are away over the summer and studio lets (generally to postgraduate students) are 51 weeks. But in Edinburgh, many studio lets are 43 weeks also. So lets here could also be 43 weeks + 8 weeks.

The secretary expressed concern about the new building potentially being too big. **Responses:** Because this area has been through the planning process twice already, the developers are already aware of and will work to limits such as how the building would be seen from down Leith Walk, daylighting on Annadale Street Lane conservation-area requirements. Also, storey-height for student accommodation is less than that of hotels, which also require roof machinery.

H Tobermann suggested that the frontage should take cues from Haddington Place tenements. **Response:** it will be as library and bayed tenements; in terms of style, in keeping with horizontality of neighbouring tenements, and will not sit forward of library

4 Community Police Officer report

Police Scotland has been targeting youth problems, drugs, weapons. In Leith there were 40 stop-and-searches – these have recovered drugs and weapons. PS is now preparing for the Commonwealth Games, many officers being sent to Glasgow (now to July). Leith citizens should notice no difference in policing however.

H Tobermann asked for statistics relating to Leith Central's beats. (LCCC's area is in green on https://leithccc.files.wordpress.com/2014/01/leith-beats-all-leith-ccs.pdf.) A Graham asked for statistics for all three Leith CC areas. HT also asked whether more police helicopters had been flying recently. **Response:** PCs will feed back to their superiors re statistics. Helicopters are now available, thanks to formation of Police Scotland – they are used for missing person searches and motorbike offences *inter alia*.

J Siann reported recent criminal activity in Pirig St area (Rosslyn Crescent) – could PS meet the local community group. **Response:** PCs have reported this up their hierarchy, would be happy to speak to community group.

A resident reported problems with car revving and illegal movement in the Colonies area. **Response:** resident invited to make appointment with police so they can handle this.

Another resident noted that just beyond Smith Place, the speed limit is 30mph. However, trucks and buses regularly exceed this, especially evenings and early mornings. **Response:** Normal police cars don't have speeding-detection equipment, but PS have traffic cars and a new radar camera, and will soon start using it.

5 Office-bearers' reports

5.1 Treasurer

Income and expenditure 2014 report has been prepared – see page 5 of 2014 AGM draft minutes (https://leithccc.files.wordpress.com/2011/10/2014 05 19-draft-v21.pdf) for most recent update. Use of Anne Dargo as auditor was approved *nem con* (proposed H Tobermann, seconded Anne Finlay) – she is due to audit the minutes so they can be approved at the August meeting.

5.2 Secretary

The Easter Road post office is due to move to larger premises (56-60 Easter Road), hence providing and open-plan branch with the same products and services and longer opening hours. A resident expressed concern that disabled citizens might not be able to get to the new premises.

5.3 Gala day

This was very successful – very large turnout. M Donaldson networked with other groups, including promoting the Referendum debate. She found that many people do not know what CCs are, and asked whether the Leith CCs had had joint stall previously because she was asked about issues in other Leith CC areas. She has volunteered to keep the library stocked with leaflets about LCCC.

6 Leith Walk repairs and improvements

H Tobermann reported:

- Work is now in progress on the stretch between Pilrig St and the bottom of LW. Work on two areas within
 this stretch is due to finish this week. H Tobermann observed that work quality seems to be reasonable but
 is slightly concerned that work on this stretch will not be completed on time. In parallel, Edinburgh Council
 has finished plans (including better pedestrian crossings) for the junction at the bottom of LW and is now
 seeking contractors.
- The section from Pilrig St to the top of LW is most concerning to HT
 - o this is at the end of the overall process (scheduled to finish in 2016), while the temporary patches have not achieved as much as he had hoped so LCCC should press for more.
 - Edinburgh council may be rethinking matters because the trams may come to LW sooner rather than later and because the plans of the St James Centre area are likely to involve remodelling of the Piccardy Place roundabout (e.g. moving tram stop from York Place to Piccardy Place). Such changes would affect the top of Leith Walk, thus putting this stretch's plans in limbo.

HT asked LCCC's endorsement of his and J Siann's actions to press for minimal delay in renovating LW. <u>AGREED NEM CON</u>

There was discussion over how the Cathedral at Piccardy Place would be affected – originally Broughton Street carried on south towards the cathedral.

A Wilson stated that installation of slabs had been behind schedule but having met the contractors, work is now on schedule. He has been disappointed to find that the old BT phone-boxes have been retained, despite their frequent abuse. He also stated that the section from Annandale Street to Piccardy Place is due for further discussion by Edinburgh Council, and that if the thoroughfare is extended through the St James 'quarter', this would strongly misaffect businesses on Piccardy Place. Also, he has not received the promised specification for bus stops — he believes all stops on LW should all be reinforced to avoid potholes cause by buses (and thus reduce future maintenance costs).

H Tobermann noted that tram and bus ticketing are currently not integrated (i.e. you can't travel from Leith to the airport via bus and then tram on a single ticket), and requested LCCC's endorsement of him pursuing ticket integration. <u>AGREED NEM CON</u>

7 Friends of Pilrig Park report

There will be a clean-up day 29 July, 2pm-3:30, meeting at Balfour Street. £eithDecides-funded projects are in progress.

H Tobermannn asked about the new fencing near the special school. **Response:** this is a result of wall collapsing at Liberton – Edinburgh Council is apparently now assessing all walls near schools.

8 Planning subcommittee report

8.1 Tennant St 13/04405/FUL

There is concern about boundaries between this development and Pilrig park. FoPP has met with Balmoral International (representing developers). FoPP has since written to Edinburgh Council's planning department: FoPP generally supports this development (more footfall, increased security) but has concerns about a substation and bin-store (this could become a hotspot for antisocial behavior). Also FoPP recommends

integration of the park and the wider Leith area, and sympathetic planting on the boundary between the proposed housing and Pilrig Park. See appendix 1 for text of this letter.

JS raised concerns about access to the site.

Residents noted that the current application was for a 3-year extension of existing permission but that when permission was originally granted, the school was not operational, and that there would be increased traffic. It now is, but this has not been taken into consideration. This is despite school proximity being considered in other similar applications. Further, the land is seriously contaminated (it's the site of a former Victorian paintwork). Apparently this has not been taken into account by Edinburgh Council, so parents/residents are seeking clarity of and stronger safeguards. Local Edinburgh councillors are sympathetic to their concerns.

8.2 SESPlan

This is a second version of a structural plan covering all the Lothians, some of Scottish Borders, some of Fife, i.e. Edinburgh's commuting area, describing new major routes, power stations, housing masses etc. The current stage is *main issues report early awareness*, i.e. planners want to hear what LCCC and equivalents believe the main issues to be. H Tobermann suggested bringing two ideas into these considerations – the proposed green bridge across Leith Walk, and using the brownfield sites at Shrub Place and Shrub Hill. He also suggested considering these areas comprehensively, not piecemeal. See appendix 2 for his submission, which was endorsed *nem con* by LCCC.

The next stage is a housing needs assessment – this is of major interest to developers because it's about how much land is made available for housing. Comments are required before 1 August 2014. H Tobermann suggested housing needs are vastly overstated and gave rise to threats to the green belt. JS stated that specific sites were now being considered (the secretary ask him to circulate a list of such sites).

The secretary noted that three informative events would be held

- Wednesday 2 July (10am midday) in Midloathian room in Lothian Chambers, George IV Bridge
- Wednesday 9 July in (10am midday) in City Chambers
- Thursday 17 July (10am midday) in City Chambers

Adrian Graham was co-opted onto LCCC nem con

(Notes – at the start of the meeting, LCCC had 8 elected and 2 co-opted members. 7 elected members were at this meeting. It is permitted 16 elected and co-opted members, provided that co-opted members do not exceed a THIRD of the maximum permitted elected community council membership, i.e. there can be no more than 5 co-opted members. With Adrian's co-option, there are 8 elected and 3 co-opted members.)

Concern was raised about the old Customs House on Commercial Street – this is the preferred site for a Leith museum but, even though it is Crown property, it might be sold off to private developers. There is an open meeting arranged by M Lazarowicz MP on Sunday 20th June (2pm,South Leith Parish church, Henderson Street).

There was discussion of speed limits at the foot of Leith Walk. It was suggested that Edinburgh Council's transport committee is in favour of 20mph and that this is likely to become the speed limit on Leith Walk.

A resident raised concern about a DTZ sign which goes over roof level, and may be on a preservation-area building. He was advised to contact Edinburgh Council and ask for enforcement of relevant regulations.

M Donaldson asked for help with promoting and at the Referendum debate, and for a loan of a PA system.

I am writing on behalf of the Friends of Pilrig Park regarding the proposed development on Tennant Street (ref. 13/04405/FUL) that has a border to the north edge of Pilrig Park. Friends of Pilrig Park (FoPP) is a voluntary organisation with over 120 local members, we work closely with the local community to support the positive development of Pilrig Park through consultation and community projects.

The Committee has considered the proposed development carefully and in general supports the development. We believe that housing on this site will benefit the park by not only increasing foot fall but by improving security due to residencies overlooking the area.

However, there are concerns about the about the substation/bin-store site by the Stanwell Street entrance, access points in and out of the park from the development and the wider access into the park from Leith - in particular from Great Junction Street. Additional trees would also be welcomed.

The triangular piece of land between Stanwell street and Block 7 containing a bin store and an electrical substation is of particular concern. This seems to be creating a similar arrangement to the substation currently on the boundary of Pilrig Park and Pilrig Street, which has been a hot spot for drug abuse and anti-social behaviour for a number of years. We work closely with the local community who regularly report this as a priority concern for safety and security for the park and local communities at public meetings and in other consultations. It seems nonsensical to create an area in the development so open to misuse and which will potentially cause problems for residents of the development; Bun-sgoil Taobh na Pairce and park users further down the line. We would recommend that the developer looks again at this area of the plan.

We also believe there is a missed opportunity with regards to the integration of the development with Pilrig Park and the wider Leith Ward. Access from Great Junction Street via Pirrie Street (then Jane Street and Tennant Street), across the development between Block 6 and Block 7 into Pilrig Park would provide open and easy access for pedestrians and cyclists from Leith into the Park and vice versa. This would promote and encourage use of this beautiful park in central Edinburgh, rather than the inward looking plans currently put forward by the developer.

We recommend the developers consider sympathetic planting on the boundary between the proposed housing and Pilrig Park with small trees and low lying shrubs that will still ensure clear lines of site to the development are maintained. This would soften the impact of the development and complement the rest of the park boundary. Development of the woodlands in the park to support biodiversity is a priority area for Friends of Pilrig Park and we are developing a plan of work.

We would be happy to work directly with the developers on what species are appropriate to complement the existing planting within the Park.

On a final note, the committee was disappointed that the City of Edinburgh Council did not seek to require the developer, at an earlier stage in the planning process, to provide some benefit to the local community through improvements to Pilrig Park. This opportunity would seem to have been missed but we would urge the Council to consider this should future developments be proposed that are adjacent or in close proximity to Pilrig Park. We would happily provide a community perspective of what might be an appropriate and proportionate contribution to the Park.
